
My last newsletter (I hear you cheering!) will be brief. My final Lasallian thought is the same one I use every year at this time: a short excerpt from Saint John Baptist de La Salle's last Meditation for the Time of Retreat to the Brothers entitled: *On the reward that a Brother should expect in heaven, if he is faithful in the work.*

Saint La Salle wrote this meditation because the life of the early brothers was VERY hard – and he needed to assure them that they would one day be rewarded by Almighty God. He made sure they read this meditation every year.

I shared the meditation with the faculty this week and asked them to believe that St. La Salle wrote the meditation for them, too, for their lives as teachers are challenging, and they need to believe they are valued by Almighty God and doing His work.

I share the excerpt from the meditation with you, too, because as parents, you are the primary educators of your children as you lead them on the path to salvation. Your work as parent is hard, but it is God's work. I believe, therefore, that Saint La Salle's words apply equally to you, too:

Oh, what glory there will be for those who have instructed children, when their zeal and devotion to procure the salvation of children will be made public before all people! All heaven will resound with the thanksgiving which these blessed children will render to those who have taught them the road to heaven. Act, then, in such a way by your good and wise guidance of those who are entrusted to you, that you will procure all these blessings and all this glory for yourself.



Thank you for your parental ministry. I am profoundly awestruck by the responsibility you have in raising your children. I am most grateful that you have allowed Saint Paul's to share in your parental teaching ministry. I pray that the work we have done this past year will help insure the truth of Saint La Salle's words for all of us when our day of judgment comes and that "all heaven" is resounding with the good example and instruction you provide to your children.

Thanks for 2017 -18 and here's looking to 2018 -19 - the eighth year of our second century!



Archbishop Gregory Aymond's Message to the Young People of the Archdiocese: In the past, Archbishop Aymond issued the following letter at the end of the school year. While he didn't issue it again this year, it's worth reading again. I encourage our students to heed these words of the Archbishop:

- I pray in a special way for each of the young people in the Archdiocese of New Orleans. Know that you are important to all of our ministries, in parishes, schools and other programs.
- I am aware of the educational experience you have received in regard to the use of electronic media. You know very well how to use the tools and you know

intellectually the consequences when social media is not used respectfully.



- I want to reach out to you at the moral level and beg you to remember that it isn't how much you know that is crucial, but rather, the respect that you show for God, yourself, and others when you communicate through cell phones, computers, and other technology.
- Always treat other people in a manner that shows your awareness of their reflecting the image of God. In all ways let your friends, classmates, and acquaintances know that they are respected. Speak out if you know someone is being abused or bullied. Share the information with a parent, priest, or teacher who can step in and help. The Archdiocese of New Orleans has the staff available to help you in abusive or bullying situations.
- One of your many responsibilities at this time is to make choices which will allow you the opportunity to make decisions about your future education or career choices. Choose wisely. Choose only those opportunities and interactions which will give you a greater chance to achieve all of the goals you set for yourself and those which God has in store for you.
- If you need help, please let a member of the clergy, a Catholic School Administrator, a Director of Religious Education, or your Youth Minister know.

Assembly: I hope the students enjoyed our final President's Assembly on May 15. Here's what we did:

- Entered the gym listening to Jean-Joseph Mouret's "Rondeau" the same piece we listened to on August 11 at the first assembly of the year. The Rondeau is a baroque piece of music that set the tone for our year of drama and excitement and majesty, and it certainly has been a year of drama, excitement and majesty! I reminded the students that today was the traditional feast day of Saint John Baptist de La Salle, who was named on this day in 1950 as the Patron Saint of Teachers by Pope Pius XII. As always, we remembered those who have entered God's kingdom since our last assembly: *Mr. Richard France, grandfather of Michael Valliant '20, Mr. Gene Burleigh, uncle of Mrs. Liz Brett*, and the *Maternal grandmother of Own Hayden '21*
- Reminded the students that our Mission Statement calls us to offer strong academic, athletic, and extracurricular programs in a safe and disciplined environment and to live the Gospel values of Jesus.
- Reminded all that 2018 is a centennial year for SPS: 100 years since the Christian Brothers assumed ownership of the school from the Benedictine monks of St. Joseph Abbey. I projected a picture of the first president of Saint Paul's, Father Augustine, OSB and the first Christian Brother President, Brother Lawrence. It's important that we remember those who have gone before us!
- Introduced **Dr. Martin Kearney**, **Purcell Endowed Professorship in English at SLU and President of West Florida Division of Ancient Order of Hibernians**, the oldest and largest Catholic Charitable **Organization in the US.** Dr. Kearney presented the AOH scholarship to sophomore **Jack Bedell** for the outstanding essay Jack wrote in for recent competition.

- Introduced Dr. Jack Bedell, Sr, professor of English at SLU and poet laureate of the State of Louisiana. Dr. Bedell spoke briefly about the importance of poetry in our lives and encouraged the students to become aware of the poetic rhythms of life all around them. I couldn't agree more! - Apologized to and recognized sophomore Adam Smith who was inadvertently omitted from receiving the Superior Academic Medal at our awards ceremony on May 11.

I then said: By the authority vested in me by the Brothers of the Christian Schools, the Board of Trustees of the Saint Paul's School, the Catholic Archdiocese of New Orleans and the State of Louisiana, I recognize and honor these young men as the Saint Paul's Senior Class of 2019 – the eighth class of our second century. With this recognition go all the honors, privileges and responsibilities that being a senior imparts. For they are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, living stones building the edifice of the Mystical Christ and fulfilling the Lasallian Mission of Saint Paul's School in our age. Done in Covington, Louisiana on this 15th day of May, in the year of Our Lord, 2018 – one hundred seven years after the founding of Saint Paul's School by the Benedictine Monks of St. Joseph Abbey, 100 years after the Christian Brothers assumed ownership of Saint Paul's in 1918, and 338 years after Saint John Baptist de La Salle founded the Brothers of the Christian Schools. Benilde Hall: An extensive renovation of Benilde Hall has begun. It will be a challenging semester for us until the project is completed in early August – but the benefits will outweigh the inconvenience. More classrooms, better restrooms, an elevator, improved lighting and HVAC, additional ingress and egress, student services, and more. In case you don't know its history, Benilde Hall was built in 1959 under the principalship/presidency of the late Brother Cassian Lange. The second and third floors were open dormitories for 6th and 7th grades. The bottom floor contained study halls and recreation rooms. When SPS dropped 6th grade, the first two

floors were converted into classrooms. Interesting trivia: Trevor had one of those non-air conditioned classrooms and bought a window unit – making it one of the few air-conditioned classrooms on campus. It was cool but that unit was loud! The third floor remained a dormitory for 7th grade. When we dropped 7th grade, the third floor became the band room! (Imagine lugging all those instruments up three flights of stairs!) The current band room was a rec hall for the boarders. When the number of boarders started dropping, we moved the rec hall into La Salle Hall and converted the third floor to classrooms. And now we begin the latest (and last – at least for me!) incarnation of that storied (pun) building! Saint Benilde! Help us turn that ordinary building into an extraordinary one! 



Looking Ahead for Those Returning:

Lost and Found Final Call: We'll clear out our lost and found,

keeping what's usable and discarding what's not. If not claimed this week, we will get rid of them. We've got prescription glasses, phones, watches, sweatshirts, uniform shirts and lunch boxes galore!

Money: Parents, please stress with you son that they should NOT bring large sums of money to school. There is no need for students to have large cash amounts – which they invariable talk about which tempts others.

News worth Noting: The 2017 Children's Mental Health Report from Child Mind Institute examines the role of smartphones and social media in adolescent mental health care. Concerning Smart Phones: If this generation is going to be named after anything, the iPhone just might be it: according to a fall 2015 marketing survey, two out of three US teens owned an iPhone, about as complete a market saturation as possible for a product. The complete dominance of the smartphone among teens has had ripple effects across every area of their lives, from their social interactions to their mental health. Teenagers and young adults — ages 16 to 24 are the most intense users of social media. Benefits of social media use include enhancing friendships and decreasing loneliness. But there is also evidence that overuse has a negative impact on self-esteem and satisfaction with their lives. And this social media use is also linked to an increase in mental health problems, including anxiety, depression and suicidality. Social media's popularity among adolescents isn't surprising, since it has been shown to affect the reward centers that are so active in teen brains. An imaging study has shown that these regions are activated when participants viewed images with a lot of "Likes". The response is strongest when Likes are on images posted by participant. When viewing photographs of risky behaviors ostensibly taken and posted by peers, activation in the cognitive control network decreased. Increased time on social media has had dramatic effects on teen behavior, including fewer risky social activities and more mental health symptoms. "Displacement" may account for these effects. If social media replaces negative activities or isolation, it can be positive. If it replaces face-to-face interaction or exercise, it can be negative.

News worth Noting II: Volunteerism boosts self-esteem. The Journal of Adolescence reported that volunteering to assist strangers yielded more long-term benefits in teens than helping family or friends. In addition to having positive psychological impacts on teens, volunteering can increase physical exercise and prevent loneliness. Helping others does not have to be done on a grand scale, a small act of kindness is a great place to start. Read more on this story.

Phones: Please stress with your sons the need to follow school phone rules. Students must turn OFF phones in class and may only use them outside (between classes or at lunch.) A \$10 fine is assessed for violating the rule – which, unfortunately, is happening way too frequently.

Statistic: A new survey of British youngsters found the time they spend online tripled in a decade to more than 27.5 hours a week at the end of 2014. It's not just people in their late teens and early 20s who are gorging on the Web: The average adult Internet user claims to spend over 20 hours online every week, double the time from a decade ago, according to U.K. telecoms regulator Ofcom. Last year alone, the average time spent online climbed by 3.5 hours per week. And I can't imagine American kids are any different. Imagine spending a whole day each week online!

Summer Driving Safety Memo from The Causeway Commission: As of April 30, there have been 66 traffic crashes, 10 injuries and 1,114 responses on the Causeway Bridge this year. Seat belts are the single most effective safety feature ever invented and have helped save thousands of lives. Sadly, one in five Americans fail to regularly wear a seat belt when driving or riding in a motor vehicle. There are more than 100 Louisiana law enforcement agencies participating in the "Click It or Ticket" campaign. By maintaining "Click It or Ticket" high visibility enforcement and awareness, we will continue to reduce seat belt fatalities on Louisiana's roads.

Summer Reading: ALL students have a summer reading obligation for their English class. The list and discussion questions are posted on Edline. Please encourage your son to take his summer reading obligation seriously. We deliberately limit the number of books to be read in order not to make this an onerous task, and we certainly encourage more reading that just what we are requiring. Toward that end, I offer the following:

- We often see that a student's weakest ACT score is in reading. Why? Students don't like to read! Solution? Read more! PLEASE insist your son devote part of each day (30 minutes? 15? 10?) to reading. He's used to this in school with SSR (I hope you know what SSR is!) This could be a family activity set aside time when the whole family reads. Turn off the TV, i-pad, X-Box, phone, the computer and read.
- And speaking of ACT /SAT scores, summer provides an excellent opportunity to prepare. There are local formal courses, but both ACT and SAT offer on-line prep programs at very reasonable costs. Or just purchase one of the many test preparation books on the market and ask your son to spend 15 minutes a day preparing. Long-term preparation is the only solution. You can't "cram" for an ACT or SAT.
